If you are being bullied:-

DO:-

- Ask them to STOP if you can
- Use eye contact and tell them to go away
- Ignore them
- Walk away
- TELL SOMEONE
- Don't think it will sort itself out
- Remember it is not your fault



DON'T:-

- Do what the bully says
- Get angry or look upset
- Hit them or fight back
- Think it's your fault
- · Hide it

What is Bullying?

A bully is someone who hurts someone else by using behaviour which is meant to hurt, frighten or upset another person. This behaviour is repeated frequently.



Emotional: Hurting people's feeling, leaving you out

Physical: Punching, kicking, spitting, hitting, pushing

Verbal: Being teased, name calling

Cyber: saying unkind things by text, email

Silent: Ignoring, excluding
