What have we been talking about

This term, the Board has met as a full team, there have been sub-committee meetings for Finance and Audit. Trustees have discussed key local issues including the falling roll concern in our county and national changes to the Ofsted framework. Trustees reviewed end of year outcomes, looked at staff development, learnt about curriculum development, and looked at key financial documents including how the schools spend the pupil premium and sports funding budgets. Trustees review a range of reports including the School Development Plan, and those from the Local Authority and the Department of Education to inform their understanding of how the school is performing against national targets.

The school is also working with Nottingham Net Zero Hub, to upgrade our school boilers to a more sustainable model.

Trustee visit Monitoring

Trustees have agreed this years monitoring schedule. We have already begun our monitoring in key areas including; Art and Design, French and SEND.

Outstanding Achievements

In the Summer term of each year, Year 6 children take their standard assessment tests (SATs) in reading, grammar and mathematics and writing skills. End of key stage assessments are compared to other schools in England and published nationally as an indicator of relative performance. We are particularly proud of how well children from disadvantaged backgrounds do compared to other pupils in England. These measures are an important recognition of the hard work of children and staff, but also show that having a rich and exciting curriculum, alongside high expectations and great teaching, make a real difference to how well children do with these crucial reading, writing and mathematics skills. As Trustees we are committed to ensuring that this rich curriculum remains an integral feature of our school.
